Berkeley Lab has a great legacy of accomplishments that have shaped modern science and technology. The awarding of the 2011 Nobel Prize in Physics to Saul Perlmutter brings this to the forefront. However, it also reminds me how quickly the accomplishments of the past are overshadowed by the dynamics of the present at Berkeley Lab. We have had a number of events and activities. A sad note is the passing of Per Dahl, EX-Ls President 2001. Eleanor and Per were so much a part of the EX-Ls, and have been regular attendees at Board of Director meetings and luncheons. Per came to the Berkeley Lab to work on the Superconducting Super Collider design team. He was an expert in superconducting magnets. I had almost forgotten that LBNL had the SSC design team on site. As you read "In Memory of Per Dahl" you will be struck by his rich intellectual life and his contributions and connections to key science and technology milestones. I turn now to a more joyous event, the Cirque De Science Open House celebration. EX-Ls were able to secure a booth in one of the main areas, the cafeteria parking lot. Rich Sextro, with a great never-say-die attitude, recovered the model of the Bevatron and did some renovations. Richard Jared and Vicky provided a display and video of the building of the Keck Telescope. I had periodic tables signed by Albert Ghiorso, discoverer of 12 elements. Visitors from the community stopped by to view the displays and hear stories of these facilities and accomplishments each having rich but fading legacies today. The Bevatron model attracted many current and retired LBNL staff who added their own stories. How many more legacy stories do we have as hidden treasurers in the artifacts and memories of our members? We have proposed to the Lab the idea of capturing short legacy talks by members of the EX-Ls that can be posted on the LBNL web site.

The results of the survey of Berkeley Lab retirees are being analyzed by the Ad Hoc Survey Committee and Janis Dairiki reports on preliminary findings. It is clear that we retirees remain active professionally and in-service to the community. Laboratory Director Paul Alivisatos has made community relations a priority and we believe that EX-Ls members can be an important liaison of good will for the Lab, as recently demonstrated at the Open House and at the Solano Stroll. Watch for volunteer opportunities to assist the Lab with its photo archives.

The quarterly EX-Ls luncheons continue to be well attended. Doug McWilliams captivated us with his life story as a photographer. The luncheons are one of the primary activities fulfilling the purpose of the EX-Ls Association.

Another purpose is to be a vehicle for maintaining contact with the Lab. One EX-L member recently told me that he was turned away at the gate when he tried to visit and left. There are two ways to avoid this. First, obtain a retiree ID from the Site Access office (Building 65A) at the Lab. To issue an ID the Site Access office requires that you bring a form signed by the HR representative of the Division from which you retired. Contacting your Division is the first step to obtaining an ID that will allow you access to the Lab. Second, you can contact someone you know at the Lab to serve as your host and they will submit on-line a one day pass request that will be emailed to you. If you do not have a contact then let me or a member of the Executive Committee know and a host can be found. We are using email more frequently to advise members of the opportunities and events of interest. To avoid missing deadlines I suggest you keep a daily watch for messages from Dick Baker. If you do not have him listed as Dick Baker in your email address list it will likely show up as xrobaker@comcast.net.

This is my final report as 2011 President of EX-Ls. I want to acknowledge the following folks who have served multiple years, are the mainstay of the EX-Ls Association, and have contributed so much this past year: Richard Baker our Web master, Louise Vogelsberg - Newsletter Editor, Dave Stevens - past Newsletter Editor; Don Grether and Rich Sextro both Past Presidents active on Ad Hoc committees and representatives to the UC Berkeley Retirement Center; Janis Dairiki representative to the retirement organizations, CUCRA and AROHE and chair of the LBNL retired employee survey ad hoc committee; Vicky Jared, our activities coordinator, who not only coordinates the logistics of the luncheons but takes the lead in representing EX-Ls at events such as the Solano Stroll and Open House to mention two this year. Thank you Vicky for your joyful contributions. "THE BEVATRON DEMOLITION PROJECT"

Luncheon Speakers for November 17, 2011 Speakers: Joe Harkins, Project Director and Bob Cronin, Project Manager

For most of us who worked at LBNL for any number of years, the signature facility that defined the landscape of the hill was the Bevatron. Constructed in the early 1950's, it quickly proved its worth by facilitating the discovery of the anti-proton. It remained a dominant facility in the development of particle physics and later nuclear science until it was turned off in 1993. In the years following, there was considerable planning for its decommissioning followed by the eventual demolition of the facility. The luncheon speakers will describe this phase of the Bevatron's history.

Joe Harkins has been at LBNL for the past 22 years where he has worked in the Facilities Division (previously "Plant Engineering") as well as in the ALS Division.

One of Joe's first efforts was the proposal for the seismic upgrade of building 90 following the Loma Prieta earthquake. Joe also managed the design and construction of the Hazards Waste Handling Facility and numerous other lab renovations.

In 1996 Joe joined the ALS Division and managed the design and installation of the Super Bends, the Third Harmonic Cavities and multiple maintenance shutdowns at the ALS. In 2002, Joe rejoined the Facilities Division to manage the Molecular Foundry Project, which was completed in 2006. He then became the project director for the Bevatron Demolition as well as the ALS User Support Building and Helios construction projects. Joe is currently working in the pre-conceptual plans for the Next Generation Light Source (NGLS).

Bob Cronin has 30 years experience in the nuclear industry, including with commercial nuclear power projects and DOE nuclear decontamination and decommissioning projects. Bob has worked on numerous projects, including Bechtel's design & construction of Pennsylvania's Limerick Nuclear Generating Station, the clean-up of the DOE Hanford tank farms, and the closure of the DOE Rocky Flats Environmental Technology Site. Bob has managed the demolition of the Juggernaut research reactor at Argonne National Laboratory, the Atomic Vapor Laser Isotope Separation (AVLIS) system at LLNL, and the Ford nuclear reactor at University of Michigan.

In September 2007, Bob was contracted to work as the project director for the Bevatron demolition. Bob expects to finish the Bevatron demolition project late this year.

The talk will highlight the course the project took from

Bevatron shutdown to project approval, the plans for demolition and how these were modified and executed by the contractor, and the lessons learned along the way. A pictorial recap of the demolition will be presented. The talk will also touch on the environmental process, the political/public challenges and the Bevatron Farewell event.

COMMUNITY RELATIONS UPDATE

IN MEMORY OF PER DAHL - EX-LS PRESIDENT 2001

Per Fridtjof Dahl, a physicist, artist, and historian of modern physics died on October 1, 2011 after a two-to-three year-long struggle with lung cancer.

Per Dahl was born at Georgetown Hospital in Washington, D.C., on August 1, 1932. His parents were Odd Dahl, from Drammen, Norway, and Anna Augusta (Vesse),

from Eau Claire, Wisconsin. Dahl was born while his father was working at the Carnegie Institution in Washington, D.C. In 1936, his father saw the war coming and decided to take his family back to Bergen, Norway. He returned to Norway in 1937 to oversee science in Norway during the war.

Dahl grew up in Bergen, Norway, from the age of 4 until he was 17. He then came to the U.S. and served three years in the U.S. Army, including two years stationed on Guam in the Pacific. Taking after his father, Dahl was interested in science and physics from an early age. He studied science during his Army years, and after leaving the

service he entered the University of Wisconsin, obtaining his Ph.D. in Physics in 1960. His post-doctoral work was done at the Niels Bohr Institute in Copenhagen, Denmark.

Per Dahl came to Brookhaven National Laboratory (BNL) in 1963. He arrived at a time when superconductors were beginning to move from laboratory development to industrial production. At this time, development of accelerator magnets using NbTi and Nb₃Sn began. Per became involved in the design of these magnets early in his BNL career and acquired a good understanding both of the materials and their use in magnets. He put this knowledge to good use later in his BNL career when he became the principal person writing about magnets and superconductors for technically-oriented audiences. This work also provided him with an opportunity to display his skills as an artist. His drawing that shows all the critical components of a superconducting cable is still used in talks for visitors to Brookhaven.

Per began working on the larger stage of the Superconducting Super Collider (SSC) in 1987, where he continued work documenting the magnet program. When the SSC effort moved from the design location, Berkeley,



to the laboratory location in Texas, Per expanded his work to include both the documentation of the conventional construction effort and preparation of information in support of the SSC mission (e.g., publisher of the SSC News).

Following termination of the SSC project in 1993, Per moved to the Accelerator and Fusion Research Division at Lawrence Berkeley National Lab (LBNL). During much of that time he was on leave to the Office of High Energy Physics, where he was Program Officer for a number of

> university grants. He also consulted with BNL about the nascent RHIC magnet system. He retired from LBNL in 1996 but kept contact with the Lab through a visiting scientist appointment and work at the Office for the History of Science and Technology at UC-Berkeley until 2005.

> Dahl is the author of numerous scientific papers and several books: *From Nuclear Transmutation to Nuclear Fission, 1932-1939* (Institute of Physics Publishing, Co., Bristol, England and Philadelphia, PA, USA, 2002); *Heavy Water and the Wartime Race for Nuclear Energy* (Institute of Physics Publishing, Co., UK,

Bristol England and Philadelphia, PA, USA, 1999), which was featured in the NOVA TV-production, *Hitler's Sunken Secret*, DOX Production, London, 2004; *Flash of the Cathode Rays: A History of J.J. Thomson's Electron* (Institute of Physics Publishing, Co., UK, Bristol, England and Philadelphia, USA, 1997); *Superconductivity: Its Historical Roots and Development from Mercury to the Ceramic Oxides* (American Institute of Physics, New York, 1992); *Ludvig Colding and the Conservation of Energy Principle: Experimental and Philosophical Contributions*, The Sources of Science N. 104 (Johnson Reprint Corp., New York and London, 1972).

Throughout his life, Dahl was able to pursue his love for physics, art and his family. While at Brookhaven, he was a president of the South Bay Art Association (1967-1968), and he was also the president of the Brookhaven National Laboratory Art Society for several years. He was a fellow of the American Physical Society.

He is survived by his devoted wife of 45 years, Eleanor, and two sons: Erik (married to Christa), of Pebble Beach, CA; and Thomas (married to Jo) and two grandchildren, Emily and Alex, of Westford, MA.

From now on Rich Sextro will be known as the miracle man. He enthusiastically volunteered to have the Bevatron model at the booth. This is the model that was in the lobby of the Bevatron for so many years. It had been a forgotten item in the warehouse once the Bevatron demolition started. Having made this commitment Rich faced every possible obstacle in getting it to the Lab and personally renovating it. Recent retiree Marilee Bailey helped obtain permission for the EX-Ls to use the model and Ben Feinberg provided a reminder tutorial on the Bevatron components and how it operated. It was a miracle effort on Rich's part. It turned out to be a big attraction and I think that Rich savored repeating the story of the Bevatron almost nonstop for 5 hours.

Rollie is always ready to tell the story of the legacy of the Lab in expanding the periodic table of elements. This too was a very popular attraction.

<u>LBNL RETIREE SURVEY STATUS REPORT</u> <u>10/13/2011</u>

The LBNL retiree survey (designed and administered by the EX-Ls) was launched on June 11 and closed on August 31. We received **425 responses** (19% of the total 2282 LBNL retirees). It should be noted that the UC Berkeley Retirement Center which sent out the initial notice of the survey and many e-mail reminders has e-mail addresses for only 500 of the total retirees; the other ~1800 retirees were contacted via the Center's newsletter, the CenterPiece, and a postcard mailing by the EX-Ls.

Analysis of the results is still underway, but we can already see there are many interesting and useful responses that will allow us to create a fairly broad and comprehensive picture of Lab retirees. Here's a preview:

- 328 (~78%) of respondents are between the ages of 60 and 80; 214 (56%) have been retired ≤ 10 yrs, 121 (32%) between 11 and 20 yrs
- 70% of the respondents are male, 30% female
- The majority of respondents (81%) live in the East Bay or Greater Bay Area
- 180 EX-Ls members (out of a total membership of 271) responded to the survey; 147 respondents were about evenly divided over whether the EX-Ls ought to organize more social events; 2/3s of the 180 found the newsletter and email as the best way to communicate with them (the recent move to an electronic newsletter was probably not reflected in this)
- 183 respondents are scientists or engineers; 188 respondents were active professionally within the last 3 years, with many publications, invited talks, and students tutored
- Retirees have been active volunteers, both at the Lab (42) and in their communities (212)
- 23 received awards for professional activities and 21 for community service
- 310 responded with educational activities like attending lectures, college level courses, etc.; 400 respondents reported on activities/hobbies – the 5 most frequent activities were reading, computer, dining out, gardening, and travel

- 54% of 393 respondents felt they were very well prepared for retirement and another 25% felt they were well prepared (4 on a scale of 1 – 5)
- 42 and 41%, respectively, reported that their health was either good (4 out of 5) or excellent (5 of 5)
- 15% of the respondents are caregivers for a parent/spouse-partner/adult child, etc.
- 56% reported that their retirement experience so far has been excellent and another 32% report that it has been good (4 on a scale of 1-5)
- 284 respondents provided insights into what surprised them most about retirement – many of them noting how fast the time goes and how busy they are, how much fun they are having and how satisfied they are; and some noting the loss of a loved one or a noticeable reduction in physical and mental abilities

We are now continuing the data analysis and deciding how best to present the data. Final results will be posted on the EX-Ls website

Summary of Talk at the August 18, 2011 Luncheon Speaker: Doug McWilliams Title: Everywhere I Look, I See Pictures

Doug McWilliams, LBNL retiree and Ex-Ls member is remembered by most of us as the Laboratory photographer who helped chronicle important Laboratory events over several decades before retiring in 1991. What most of us didn't know was that he had a parallel career as a highly successful sports photographer. In this role, he combined his early interest in professional baseball with his expertise in photography to rise to a level that could be the envy of every young baseball fan-he took the pictures that became the visuals for baseball bubble gum cards. He recently donated a private collection of 14,000 photos to the Baseball Hall-of-Fame in Cooperstown where he was also inducted as a member. His talk at the Ex-Ls luncheon combined reminiscences of his career within the Lab, his unique experiences as a sports photographer and, as he is quick to point out, as a successful photographer with broad interests. The title of his talk reflected his unique view of life: "Every Where I Look, I See Pictures".

Doug described how his interest in photography began at an early age. Working with the limited resources of a teenage enthusiast, he followed the fortunes of the Oakland Oaks at their park in Emeryville. His early photos in black and white reflected the limitations imposed by the relatively high cost of color.

His educational decisions reflected his creative interests. He enrolled in the University of Kansas Journalism School with a focus on photography. In 1957 he returned to California to study at the Brooks Institute of Photography in Santa Barbara. While there he began practicing his trade in the entertainment industry in Hollywood where he photographed several new faces on the scene who eventually became well-known performers. He soon moved back to the Bay Area where he served in the military, married a local girl and joined the Laboratory (not necessarily in that order).

Doug told many fascinating stories associated with his photography career. He proudly pointed to his innovative

approach to portraits in which he emphasized informal settings and poses that helped communicate something specific about the personality of the subject. Many of the photos involved well-known members of the Laboratory community including several Nobel laureates. He also showed candid photos he had taken of John Kennedy and the Prince of Wales on their respective visits to campus and the Lab. He later photographed the Queen herself during her birthday celebration in England. Each picture that Doug showed was accompanied by appropriate interesting anecdotes concerning the experience.

Doug showed several examples that illustrated his creativity in technical photography. He met the challenge of making mundane objects in the laboratory visually interesting while at the same time including the human dimension in photos of large, complex apparatus. Several examples were given including one showing his innovative technique for photographing laser beams.

The second part of the talk concerned his work in baseball photography. He described how his early interest in the game coupled with acquaintances he made of Oakland A's stars in the 1970's, placed him on his path to success. Starting with publicity photos of some of the A's stars, Doug's career eventually evolved to the point where he spent several weeks each spring playing hooky from the Lab while he photographed players in Arizona spring training. Doug presented multiple examples of photos that he had taken of major league stars recognizable to even the most casual follower of the sport. Again, there were interesting anecdotes about many of the personalities and how he photographed them.

Doug is now retired from both careers and spends his time reviewing and cataloging tens of thousands of photos in his collection. Since a picture is worth a thousand words, we have created a website where we have included a few of the memorable photos Doug showed at the luncheon.
