UCB Library Card

Obtain a free UC Berkeley Library card, good for use at all campus libraries, by taking your Retiree ID and a California-issued photo ID to the Privileges Desk in Doe Library.

Did you know? Cal's Library consists of 32 constituent and affiliated libraries that together make it the sixth largest university library by number of volumes in the United States. It has over 11 million volumes and maintains over 70.000 serial titles!

Retiree Parking Permit Program

Night and Weekend Parking

Single-use Night and Weekend (NW) hang-tag permits allow retirees to park in unreserved lots on campus after 4:30pm M-F, and all day on weekends. NW permits are sold only in packs of 10 or 20; 10 permits cost \$50; 20 permits cost \$90.

Central Campus Retiree Permit Parking

Central Campus (C) single-use hang-tag permits are available to retirees for \$5 each for the sole purpose of attending UCB Retirement Center programs and events. If you purchase permits and end up not using them for the planned UCBRC event, save the permit to use for a future UCBRC event. C permits allow retirees to park in unreserved lots on campus at any time of day. You may purchase as many C permits as you need to attend the programs that you are currently enrolled in. Please note: Retirement Center-issued C permits may not be used for any purpose other than to attend a Retirement Center program or event.

How to Purchase Permits

At this time, the UCB Retirement Center is only able to accept checks or money orders made out to UC Regents. You may purchase permits by mail for an additional \$2 per order, or in person at 101 University Hall during open hours, M-F 1pm-4pm.

UC Press Discount

Spotlight

Mary Graham - Distinguished UCB Retiree



Mary Graham retired last June after working at Cal for 33 years. Her Cal affiliation runs deep: Two of her aunts graduated from Cal in 1930, and Mary earned a degree in English here in 1970. 1970 was the year of the Kent State shootings and the People's Park riots, and Cal students went on strike. "The campus awarded a blanket "B" for all courses that spring," she recalls, "and I've always believed that's why I passed Physics!"

Starting as an administrative assistant in the Nuclear Medicine group at what was then known as LBL, Mary transferred to a position at the UCLA Medical Center in 1981. Serious health problems in the late 1980s led her to rethink her career and she returned to campus in 1991 in a support staff position in the College of Natural Resources. "The cool thing about working at Berkeley is that the system allows for flexibility—I could return in a lower job classification without penalty." When her health stabilized, she started up the career ladder again, becoming a Management Services Officer (MSO) in 1999 and then departmental Human Resources Manager in 2005.

Mary loved the years she spent as an MSO helping to build a culture of collegiality among staff, students and faculty. A pivotal experience for Mary was enrolling in the Supervisor Development Workshop series run by Alan deHerrera in Human Resources, where she learned how to develop a campus-wide staff network to navigate Berkeley's complex (and often arcane) administrative systems. Networking was one key to Mary's success at Berkeley, and she misses the daily interactions with campus colleagues.

RETIREE OF DISTINCTION

An accomplishment Mary was very proud to have been part of the Berkeley Staff Association's mentorship program, which matches those less-experienced with seasoned staff to explore career development opportunities. She participated in the 2005 pilot program, and was an active member of the organizing committee until she retired. Three staff that she mentored through the BSA mentorship program went on to higher-level positions at Cal.

For the last seven years of her career, Mary was an Academic Personnel Policy Analyst with the campus committee on Budget and Interdepartmental Relations. The Budget Committee, as it is informally known (sometimes with trepidation, she notes) reviews and makes recommendations on faculty personnel actions including appointments, promotions, merits and retentions.

Mary began to contemplate retirement years before the actual event. "Like everyone else, I wondered how I would fill my time—what would I do? I read books and talked with retired friends and family. Everyone had the same advice: Start planning now!" Upon retirement, Mary was most surprised by the overwhelming feeling of relief. The freedom to structure her own time and to get up when she wanted was brand new—but it did take about six months for her to settle in to her new lifestyle.

Well before retirement, Mary started volunteering for Ashby Village, a local non-profit that provides access to resources and develops volunteer-based, interactive programs designed to help elders stay in their own homes. Mary's latest passion is exploring the possibilities for collaboration between Ashby Village and the UCB Retirement Center. "I'd like to help develop a peer-topeer program in which retirees could be paired with folks contemplating retirement—a retirement mentorship program!"

Mary suggests new retirees make a list of projects they would like to take up or get back to. For her, that included volunteer work. "Without work constraints, there is the added benefit of spontaneity—you can change plans without worrying about using up your vacation time!" She encourages us all to find something to be passionate about—a meaningful project or two and, most importantly, plan things to look forward to.

ANTHEM CYBERATTACK UPDATE

On January 29, 2015, Anthem, Inc. (Anthem) learned of a cyberattack to their IT system. The cyberattackers tried to get private information about current and former Anthem members. Anthem believes the attack happened over the course of several weeks beginning in early December 2014.

Anthem began working to close the security vulnerability and contacted the FBI as soon as they discovered the attack. Anthem has also retained cybersecurity firm Mandiant to assist them in the investigation and to strengthen the security of their systems.

Current or former members of Anthem's affiliated health plans may be impacted. In addition, some members of other independent Blue Cross and Blue Shield plans who received healthcare services in any of the areas that Anthem serves over the last 10 years may be impacted. **If you have been impacted, Anthem has arranged to have AllClear ID protect your identity for two (2) years at no cost**. NEIL J. SMELSER, 2015 EMERITUS OF THE YEAR

The UC Berkeley Emeriti Association has just announced the selection of Neil J. Smelser, University Professor of Sociology Emeritus, as its Distinguished Emeritus of the Year for 2015. Professor Smelser will receive this award at a fall luncheon, at which he will also be the guest speaker.

Professor Smelser "retired" in 1994 and promptly became the Director of the Center for Advanced Study in the Behavioral Sciences at Stanford University until 2001. In the twenty years since his retirement, he has published seven books, 23 major articles and 40 other papers. He has focused his work in the social sciences as well as higher education, terrorism, and the Free Speech Movement.

Recently, Professor Smelser joined the Learning In Retirement committee and organized the March 2015 series on Themes in Higher Education. Distinguished and very active, this Emeritus of the Year shows no signs of reduced activity in research, teaching and service to the Berkeley campus. Congratulations to Professor Smelser!

BERKELEY ART MUSEUM UPDATE

From the museum: We are excited by the tremendous progress on the new BAM/PFA building in downtown Berkeley. One of the most noticeable changes is the removal of the tower crane from the jobsite. Our move to the new building will be a massive undertaking. We have started to inventory, pack, and transport our collection of over 19,000 works of art and hundreds of thousands of books, magazines, and clippings.

We've bought 144 rolls of brown plastic packing tape to help us pack everything up. Six miles of tape... enough to circle the UC Berkeley campus almost three times! We'll use five hundred sheets of cardboard totaling 4,000 linear feet, about the distance between the two towers on the Golden Gate Bridge.

We are looking ahead with excitement to the many opportunities that our new building will provide for collection access and engagement.

The Film Library and Study Center will feature BAM/PFA's exceptional collection of books, periodicals, clippings, and other ephemera related to the history of film and video, as well as opportunities for researchers and the general public to view films and videos from our extensive collection.

The Asian Art Study Center will house our worldrenowned collection of Chinese ink scrolls as well as Japanese prints, Indian miniatures, and other historical works on paper. In the Works on Paper Study Center, you will be able to examine our thousands of prints, drawings, and photographs.

The Steven Leiber Conceptual Art Study Center will make accessible our unparalleled collection of Conceptual art, reference books, and related ephemera.

You will also be able to enjoy our library of contemporary poetry and experimental fiction in the Reading Room, visit the Art Lab for drop-in art making, watch films on our outdoor LED screen, and gather in a variety of delightful spaces. We hope that everyone will feel welcome at BAM/PFA and will find their own ways to discover the art and film of the world.
