EMERITI PRIVILEGES AND BENEFITS

Did you know as an emeritus/a you ...

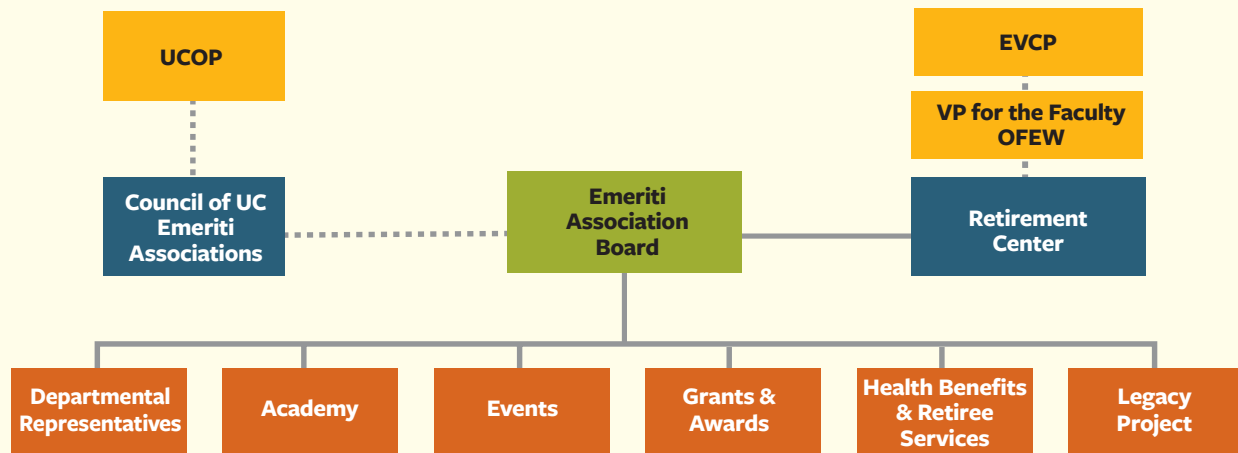
- Continue membership and voting rights in the Academic Senate.
- Have lifetime email and library privileges, and access to software.
- Are eligible to serve on graduate degree committees.
- Continue departmental membership; voting rights vary by department.
- Maintain principal investigator status on grants.
- May use the name of the vacated endowed chair position in your academic title.
- May be recalled or volunteer for teaching, research and service.
- May participate in the Emeriti Research Enabling Grant program.
- Have reduced rates on parking permits, both daily and central campus.
- Are granted automatic membership in the UCB Emeriti Association.
- Are encouraged to join the UCB Emeriti Academy.

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UC Berkeley Emeriti Association (UCBEA)

UCBEA serves as an advocate for emeriti (campus- and system-wide), supports emeriti wishing to remain engaged with the research, teaching and service missions of the University, and provides opportunities for professional and social engagement. It:

- Builds an interdisciplinary community through lecture luncheons and other events.
- Administers small emeriti research-enabling grants.
- Manages awards recognizing emeriti contributions to the university.
- Facilitates the Emeriti Legacy Project documenting faculty careers at Berkeley.
- Advocates for its members on issues such as health insurance benefits and the operation of the Retirement Administration Service Center (RASC).
- Provides leadership support for the Departmental Emeriti Representatives and the Emeriti Academy.

Departmental Emeriti Representatives

- Foster a sense of community among emeriti within the department.
- Determine and promote best practices to department chairs.
- Advocate for and educate chairs on emeriti matters.
- Share information about Emeriti Association and Academy activities with emeriti and later-career faculty.
- Serve as a resource for emeriti and pre-retirement faculty, providing guidance on contacts and support services.

UC Berkeley Emeriti Academy

- Facilitates mentoring opportunities for emeriti.
- Supports interdisciplinary team-teaching.
- Showcases emeriti work with students through annual events such as the Emeriti as Mentors Poster Session.
- Hosts interdisciplinary events (e.g., public discussion panels).
- All emeriti are eligible to join the Academy through the completion of a short enrollment form.

Support for Undergraduates with Navigating Berkeley

UC Berkeley can be intimidating and challenging for undergraduate students to navigate. Each semester, the Emeriti Academy hosts panels on demystifying office hours and demystifying research. The panels on **Demystifying Office Hours: Advice from Faculty** aim at reducing barriers for undergraduate students to sign up for office hours with their professors. After each panel, students can request a one-time, one-on-one coaching session with an emeritus/a in their academic field of choice. We need emeriti volunteers to serve as a coach. 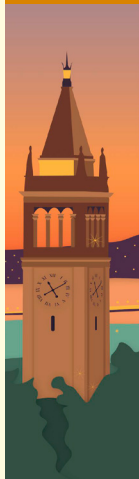
